## EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Rural Municipality (RM) of St. Clements is considering whether to initiate the planning process to resume quarry operations on land it owns in the Gull Lake area. The RM viewed local stakeholder engagement as critical to identify concerns about the project before making any decisions on its status. The enclosed report, prepared by Scatliff + Miller + Murray (SMM), discusses the outcome of the engagement undertaken by SMM and RM staff about the project.

Based on the feedback received, the project represents both potential opportunities and risks:

1. On the one hand, the project would enable the RM to use its own resources for public infrastructure initiatives, rather than relying on private industry to fill this void. Over its 20-to-30-year life cycle, the project could save RM ratepayers up to \$175,000 per year on public infrastructure spending. But the RM recognizes the need to determine whether the potential adverse effects of the project on the natural and built environments can be addressed. As such, the RM supports undertaking site assessments, preparing operational plans, and implementing mitigation measures based on this work e.g. installing noise / visibility berms, employing municipal weekday operational hours and stone crushing every 3 years during the Fall/Winter, ensuring excavations remain above the water table, conducting progressive site rehabilitation to enable adaptive site re-use for future community benefit, etc.
2. On the other hand, there is significant local opposition to the project due to the following inter-related risks:
  - a) The potential adverse effects of the project on the natural and built environments.
  - b) The cumulative adverse effects from the existing and abandoned pits in the Gull Lake area which have been communicated by local residents but remain unquantified.
  - c) The acknowledgement by Provincial officials and staff to stakeholders and RM staff that the regulatory enforcement of active pits and the implementation of progressive rehabilitation measures of pits in Manitoba have fallen short and need improvement.


Therefore, this report recommends that the RM of St. Clements should collaborate with local and broader community stakeholders and residents as well as with Brokenhead Ojibway Nation and the RM of Alexander in advocating to the Province that a cumulative impact assessment (CIA) be undertaken of aggregate operations in the Gull Lake area. The CIA would focus on:

1. The use of qualitative and quantitative factors to assess the impacts of active and abandoned pits in the Gull Lake area as well as the capacity of the Gull Lake area to support future aggregate project(s), including the RM's potential project cited in this report.
2. The identification and assessment of the effectiveness of mitigation options to potentially manage the cumulative effects resulting from the outcome of the impact analysis.
3. Stakeholder collaboration and public documentation of the CIA process and outcome.

The anticipated outcome from the CIA would serve the broader public interest, show that the RM is responding to current concerns about aggregate operations in the Gull Lake area, and further inform the RM's decision on whether to advance its own project beyond the CIA stage.

## 1.0 Introduction

The Rural Municipality (RM) of St. Clements is considering whether to initiate the planning process in support of resuming quarry operations on land it owns east of Provincial Trunk Highway (PTH) No. 59 along Stead Road (see Figure 1). In addition to a mix of surrounding agricultural and agricultural-related uses, other nearby land uses include four quarry operations, permanent and seasonal residences along Gull Lake as well as the Brokenhead Ojibway Nation and Brokenhead Wetland Ecological Reserve.

The project represents a potential opportunity to incorporate and model 'best management practices' for gravel mining and site rehabilitation. It could also enable the RM to support its own public infrastructure initiatives throughout the Municipality. Conversely, there is a risk that the project could also negatively impact land uses and ecological resources in the area.

In light of the above, stakeholder engagement is critical to identify concerns before decisions on advancing the project can be further considered. The enclosed report prepared by SMM discusses the engagement activities undertaken by SMM and RM staff from April to August 2021 regarding this project. It also summarizes what was heard and the feedback received.

## 2.0 Project Context

### 2.1 Site and Area Context

Highlights of the project site and surrounding area are outlined below:

1. The Brokenhead Wetland Ecological Reserve (Ecological Reserve) is 1,240 hectares (ha) and contains rare plants and unique forested habitats. Its north block west of PTH No. 59 includes a peat wetland, which originates as a series of spring-fed ponds. A 1.5 km trail was installed in 2016, which extends through the forest and into the wetland area.
2. A wetland recharge area flanks the west side of Gull Lake and extends south of Stead Road. It is served by a shallow perched gravelly sand aquifer, which is ~15 metres (m) to 20 m thick immediately surrounding Gull Lake. A separate buried valley aquifer is located ~60 m below Gull Lake. It is confined and can be up to 15 m thick. The deeper aquifer is a common source for domestic water for residences in the region, notably along Gull Lake.

The shallow and deep aquifers are separated by a low permeability clay barrier. Because of this barrier, groundwater within the shallow aquifer flows outward from the Gull Lake uplands, as opposed to percolating downward to the deeper aquifer. The shallow aquifer pinches out west of PTH 59, where the groundwater flow is forced to the surface, creating the line of discharge spring sites and marl ponds of the Ecological Reserve.

3. Gull Lake is a perched kettle lake situated ~37 m above the Lake Winnipeg elevation. It has a surface area of ~110 ha and an average depth of 3.3 m. Gull Lake is fed to a limited extent by groundwater discharge from the shallow aquifer; the lake water balance is dominated however, by precipitation (i.e. rainfall, snow, snowmelt). The Gull Lake Basin Management Board Inc. monitors Gull Lake's water quality.
4. The Great Trail of Canada extends from the south, through the project site and to the north along the west side of Gull Lake.
5. Construction of the seasonal and permanent residences along Gull Lake started in the 1930s. The Gull Lake Ratepayers Association represents its members who own property along Gull Lake.
6. Quarry operations in the Gull Lake area date back to the 1950s. These lands have an abundant supply of aggregate near the ground surface, and the area is also near established Provincial and Municipal hauling routes.
7. The project site is designated 'Resource & Agriculture (RA)' in the Red River Planning District Development Plan By-Law 272/19 (see Figure 2). The 'RA' designation protects areas for agricultural uses as well as mines and quarries. Other pertinent Development Plan policies include:
  - a) In areas capable of supporting mines or quarries, permitted uses are those that will provide access to the resource until such time that it has been exhausted and the site is rehabilitated (note the standard of rehabilitation will be determined in consultation with the Province and in accordance with The Mines and Minerals Act) [S. 3.8.1; 4.1.1; 4.1.2].


- b) Areas within 500 m of the property limits of an active mine or quarry site shall be restricted in their use to provide a suitable buffer zone [S. 3.8.2; 4.1.3].
- c) The use(s) of exhausted mine or quarry sites shall be compatible with the resource base as well as adjacent land uses and landscapes [S. 3.8.3].
- d) Mines and quarries shall be listed as a conditional use in the Zoning By-law [S. 3.8.5].
- e) The abutting Gull Lake community to the north is designated 'Resort (R)' in the Development Plan (see Figure 2). The 'R' designation protects areas from adjacent uses that would degrade or endanger their primary function. Any intensive residential, industrial, agricultural, or commercial development or subdivision, which could conflict with a Resort area, shall not be permitted [S. 4.4.4].

8. The project site is zoned 'Agricultural General (A80)' in the RM of St. Clements Zoning By-Law 5-2002. The 'A80' Zone accommodates a range of permitted and conditional uses, including farming, livestock operations as well as mines and quarries. As per the Development Plan, mines and quarries are listed as Conditional Uses under the 'A80' Zone.

The Gull Lake community is zoned 'Seasonal Residential (SR)' in keeping with its 'Resort (R)' designation in the Development Plan (see Figure 3).

## 2.2 Project Context

The following are preliminary planning considerations to provide additional context for the project:

1. A test pit program was conducted in 2019 on most of the project site to determine its potential for 'traffic gravel' production. 58 test holes were excavated, with select samples taken. The visual and sieve analysis of the sample contents reveals an estimated stone volume of 445,798 metric tonnes, and an estimated gravel production volume ranging from 743,000 – 1,114,498 metric tonnes.
2. The project could enable the RM to support its own public infrastructure initiatives throughout the Municipality.
3. Based on an anticipated extraction rate of ~35,000 metric tonnes per year, the project would have a projected 20-to-30-year life cycle. Over this period, it is estimated that the RM could

save its ratepayers as much as \$175,000 per year on public infrastructure spending (or a total savings ranging from ~\$3.5M to \$5.25M).

4. Public concern over the potential adverse effects of quarries in the Gull Lake area had been expressed to RM Council and staff prior to the introduction of this project. Consequently, the RM corresponded with the Manitoba Department of Sustainable Development on May 24/19 in both advocating for – and seeking clarification on – these concerns. In response, the Province referenced a report, entitled ‘A Groundwater Atlas of the Gull Lake Area, Manitoba’ (2017). This report reviewed quarry development in the Gull Lake area, and concluded that there was no evidence at that time to suggest that quarries had affected the water levels in Gull Lake, due to the following:
  - a) Excavations from quarries have remained above the water table.
  - b) Nearly all quarries, including operations south of Stead Road (which includes the project site), are situated outside the catchment of the shallow aquifer surrounding Gull Lake (i.e. the Gull Lake basin shown on Figure 1).
  - c) Groundwater typically flows outward and away from Gull Lake since Gull Lake is a perched kettle lake, and the shallow and deep aquifers are separated by the low permeability clay barrier.
5. In regard to the Great Trail which extends through the project site, SMM recently confirmed that:
  - a) The trail route is in place only by concession of the affected property owner(s).
  - b) Any route planning here and elsewhere is in place to cover liability insurance requirements. As such, it is not uncommon for the Great Trail to close temporarily and/or relocate at the request of the affected property owner(s) in response to future development plans.

Given that decisions by the RM about project status remain pending, the above is offered for context and clarification. However, it is equally recognized that should the project ultimately advance to the pre-planning stage, SMM understands that the RM acknowledges that sufficient care and due diligence would be necessary to determine whether the potential adverse effects of the project on both the natural and built environments can be appropriately addressed. As such, SMM also understands that the RM supports the following principles as the basis for introducing the project at this time:

1. Work collaboratively with area stakeholders as well as the Planning District and Province regarding issues and concerns about the project and possible strategies and solutions to address them throughout all project stages (i.e. pre-planning, design, operations, rehabilitation, and remediation).
2. Ensure compliance to all applicable Provincial, Planning District and local policies, regulations and standards, and obtaining all required permits and approvals.
3. Engage in pre-planning and site design work, including:

- a) Completing technical assessments (e.g. hydrogeological assessment; well monitoring throughout all project stages; natural / cultural heritage assessments; traffic impact study; noise / dust / vibration analyses).
  - b) Preparing operational and phasing plans (e.g. extraction zone and phasing details; buffer zones; noise and visibility berms; site storage areas; hours of operation; site circulation / haul routes; security; emergency response provisions; project monitoring, progressive site rehabilitation / remediation). The hours of operation in particular, would be planned for during the weekdays only to coincide with typical municipal operations. In addition, all stone crushing activities would be planned to occur once every three years during the late Fall or Winter months over the project life cycle.
  - c) Ensuring compliance with Provincial regulations and conformity to the Development Plan and Zoning By-law.
  - d) Implementing recommended mitigation measures from the technical assessments and operational and phasing plans, which are anticipated to address the following:
    - i. minimizing the project footprint,
    - ii. avoiding environmentally sensitive areas,
    - iii. maintaining natural drainage patterns,
    - iv. confirming project setback, noise/visibility berm and/or residential buffer zone requirements (e.g. Provincial regulations require 400 m residential buffer zones if proposed project setbacks and/or noise/visibility berms will not adequately manage adverse project effects on nearby residences),
    - v. using erosion controls (e.g. silt fencing),
    - vi. applying water to access road(s) and water / dust skirts on conveyors,
    - vii. ensuring excavation activities remain above the water table,
    - viii. confirming the hours of project operations,
    - ix. maintaining the slope stability of excavated areas and revegetate where required,
    - x. using proper fuel containment and equipment maintenance and storage techniques,
    - xi. salvaging and properly storing organics, topsoil and overburden for use during progressive site rehabilitation works, and
    - xii. preparing Operations-Maintenance and Emergency Response Manuals.
4. Implement recommended progressive site rehabilitation (i.e. once extraction in a phased area is complete, rehabilitation would be initiated using the stripping from the preceding extraction area) and remediation works to accommodate adaptive re-use of the site for community benefit (e.g. naturalization, cycling paths, walking trails).

### 3.0 Engagement Planning

Given the potential project benefits and risks, stakeholder engagement was viewed by the RM as critical to identify concerns before matters regarding project advancement in general – and project design measures in particular – was further considered. As part of the engagement planning, SMM worked with RM staff to identify relevant stakeholder groups, based on their proximity to – and interest in – the project site. The following stakeholder groups were identified:

1. Brokenhead Ojibway Nation.
2. Debwendon Inc. (Debwendon).

3. Native Orchid Conservation Inc. (NOC).
4. Gull Lake Basin Management Board Inc. (GLBMB).
5. Gull Lake Ratepayers Association (GLRA).

On April 23/21, SMM sent a letter to these stakeholder groups. The intent of this letter, a sample of which is attached to this report in Appendix A, was to:

1. Provide information about the project (as highlighted above).
2. Determine stakeholder interest in meeting with SMM and RM staff about the project.

Due to the status of COVID-19 public health protocols at the time of the initial engagement period, the stakeholder groups were invited to participate in a virtual meeting (on Zoom) with SMM and RM staff. Based on stakeholder feedback, one virtual meeting was held on May 10/21 involving representatives of Debwendon, NOC, the GLBMB, and the GLRA. A second virtual meeting was arranged with Brokenhead Ojibway Nation for May 17/21 but was rescheduled to August 9/21. This meeting was held in-person at the PTCM Hall in Brokenhead Ojibway Nation due to the status of COVID-19 public health protocols at the time.

At both meetings, SMM and RM staff gave joint PowerPoint presentations which are attached to this report in Appendix B and Appendix C. The presentations highlighted the site, area and project context; the potential project risks and responsive mitigation measures; and next steps in the stakeholder engagement process. At the conclusion of each presentation, SMM and RM staff answered questions and listened to feedback from the stakeholders about the project.

During the initial engagement period, one of the SMM letters was posted on social media. This prompted 211 emails to be sent from RM residents to RM Council and staff. Data review uncovered 40 instances in which two or more emails with the same content had been submitted from one RM resident. Due to this duplication, these 40 emails are not included in this report. The residual 171 email submissions are tabulated and attached to this report in Appendix D.

Stakeholder participation in the meetings and the email submissions received were completely voluntary. Every effort was made by SMM to ensure that the feedback collected was accurately recorded and that respondents' identities were kept anonymous.

## 4.0 Stakeholder and Resident Feedback

As provided in Table 1 below, pertinent excerpts from the feedback received about the project are grouped according to the overriding themes of *air*, *land*, *water* and *local community*. While the intent of this approach is to summarize key stakeholder issues, it should also be noted that:

1. The themes used are linked with one another, and also extend beyond the project itself to the existing and abandoned quarry operations in the Gull Lake area.
2. Given the current project status and the intent of the stakeholder engagement process, neither SMM nor RM staff have specific responses to the feedback received, apart from encouraging cross-references to the baseline project principles cited earlier.

## 5.0 Observations and Conclusions

The development of new aggregate extraction operations is an inherently sensitive land use issue. On the one hand, it is an economic generator, supporting the construction industry and cost-effective infrastructure development, both locally and regionally. On the other hand, community opposition to aggregate operations is commonplace, due in large part to its adverse environmental and land use compatibility impacts. This divide widens when these impacts are not mitigated to current regulatory standards and their residual effects are allowed to worsen due to poor operational management practices and insufficient regulatory oversight.

The engagement process as part of the RM's prospective project has yielded a similar divide.

1. The project could enable the RM to use its own land and resources to support its public infrastructure initiatives, rather than relying on private aggregate operators to fill this void. This would result in tax savings to RM ratepayers. The RM also acknowledges that sufficient care and due diligence would be necessary to determine whether the potential adverse effects of the project on both the natural and built environments can be appropriately addressed. This includes committing to progressive site rehabilitation and remediation works to enable adaptive re-use of the site for future community benefit.
2. Despite these potential opportunities and commitments, based on the stakeholder group and resident feedback received to date, it is evident that there is significant opposition to the intent of the project itself. There are three issues at-hand in this regard, namely:
  - a) The potential adverse effects from the project, as encapsulated above in the overriding themes of *air, land, water* and *local community*.
  - b) The cumulative adverse effects from the existing and abandoned quarry operations in the Gull Lake area which have been communicated by local residents but remain unquantified.
  - c) The acknowledgement by Provincial officials and staff to stakeholders and RM staff alike that the regulatory enforcement of active pit operations and the implementation of progressive rehabilitation measures of pits in Manitoba have fallen short and need improvement.

These issues feed off each other and serve to intensify community opposition and mistrust.

Therefore, it is recommended that the RM of St. Clements should collaborate with community stakeholders and residents (i.e. the Gull Lake area and broader Municipality) as well as with Brokenhead Ojibway Nation and the RM of Alexander in advocating to the Province that it enter into a partnership with the RM of St. Clements to undertake a cumulative impact assessment (CIA) of aggregate operations in the Gull Lake area. As the intent of CIAs generally is to consider the effects of similar undertakings at longer timescales, the focus of this CIA would be on active and abandoned gravel pits in the Gull Lake area as well as the capacity of the Gull Lake area to accommodate future aggregate project(s), including the RM's prospective project that is the subject of this report.

There would be several phases and sub-phases to the CIA, as follows:

1. **Scoping:** The local and broader regional issues of concern would be determined. The issues of concern would be further categorized for analysis purposes under various factors over a defined area and covering past, present and future time periods. The issues of concern and corresponding factors could be identified from background technical reports / plans / maps, interviews with regulatory agency staff, additional community engagement, field tours / surveys, etc. As noted above, the scoping framework would cover both pit operational and progressive rehabilitation measures (past and present) as well as the capacity of the Gull Lake area to accommodate additional aggregate project(s) (future).
2. **Impact Analysis:** While quarries in Manitoba do not require Environment Act Licenses, the impact analysis would build on the scoping work by applying qualitative and quantitative analyses, typically associated with environmental assessments, to the CIA study factors [e.g. hydrogeological assessment, well monitoring, natural / cultural heritage assessments, pit operation (traffic, noise, dust, vibration, hours of operation) and rehabilitation plan reviews, status reviews of abandoned pits, stakeholder / resident input, etc.].
3. **Mitigation Options:** The identification of mitigation options would serve to potentially manage the cumulative effects resulting from the outcome of the impact analysis stage. It is important to note that mitigation will not necessarily correct all potential impacts. Therefore, the significance of the effects after mitigation would also be evaluated to determine if they could become irreversible.
4. **Interim and Final Reporting:** The preparation of interim and final reports would document the CIA process. The public release of these reports would further reinforce the role of community engagement, as noted below.
5. **Engagement:** As noted above, engagement with RM stakeholders and residents (both local and at-large) as well as with Brokenhead Ojibway Nation, the RM of Alexander and regulatory agency staff is viewed as a critical component of the CIA process. This could take the form of targeted engagement at key milestones and/or more on-going engagement during the CIA through the establishment of an advisory committee, comprised of RM officials / staff and stakeholder / resident representatives. This framework would support public access to empirical evidence; build understanding of identified issues, opportunities and strategies; nurture differences of opinion as motivation to 'turn over all stones' to inform and evaluate potential options and solutions; and help to regain a degree of public trust through leadership, both on a local and regional basis.

The anticipated outcome from the CIA would serve the broader public interest, show that the RM is responding to current concerns about aggregate operations in the Gull Lake area, and further inform the RM's decision on whether to advance its own project beyond the CIA stage.

COMMUNITY AND STAKEHOLDER ENGAGEMENT REQUEST**

Scatliff + Miller + Murray (SMM) is submitting this letter on behalf of the Rural Municipality (RM) of St. Clements. We are preparing a Master Plan with the RM of St. Clements for a proposed quarry, located east of Provincial Trunk Highway (PTH) No. 59 along Stead Road (see Figure 1). The RM of St. Clements, as the owner of the site and the project proponent, views the proposed development as an opportunity to develop a sustainable prototype that exemplifies 'best practices' for gravel mining, environmental mitigation, and progressive mine rehabilitation. It could also enable the RM of St. Clements to both support and engage in cost-effective public infrastructure development (new and renewals) throughout the Municipality.

The RM of St. Clements is equally aware however, of potential project impacts on sensitive land uses and ecological resources in the area. As such, meaningful community and stakeholder engagement is critical to identify concerns before matters regarding project advancement in general – and project design measures in particular – are further considered. With this in mind, the purpose of this letter to briefly describe the project, and offer the Brokenhead Ojibway Nation an opportunity to have an introductory virtual meeting (via Zoom) with us and RM officials to receive your initial feedback about it. Additional opportunities for community and stakeholder engagement are also being planned, which will be discussed at this meeting.

## **1.0 Site Location**

As noted above and shown on Figure 1, the site is situated east of PTH No. 59 along Stead Road, ~40 km north of East Selkirk and ~20 km north of Libau. In addition to a mix of surrounding agricultural and agricultural-related uses, other nearby land uses include quarry operations to the north and east, permanent and seasonal residences along Gull Lake to the north as well as the Brokenhead Ojibway Nation and Brokenhead Wetland Ecological Reserve to the west and southwest.


Highlights of the site and surrounding area are outlined below:

1. The Province formally identified the Brokenhead Wetland Ecological Reserve in 2005. Initially comprising 563 hectares (ha), the Ecological Reserve was expanded in 2012 to its current extent of 1,240 ha. It is managed by Debwendon Inc., a non-profit organization made up of representatives from Brokenhead Ojibway Nation, the Native Orchid Conservation Inc., and Manitoba Model Forest. The Ecological Reserve contains

23 rare and uncommon plants; 28 of Manitoba's 36 native orchids; 8 of Manitoba's 10 carnivorous (or insect-eating) plants; and unique forested habitats. The north block west of PTH No. 59 includes a peat-accumulating wetland, which originates as a series of spring-fed ponds. A 1.5 km trail was installed in 2016, which extends through the forest, past the ponds and into the wetland area.

**Figure 1 - Subject Site Location**



As shown on Figure 2, a wetland recharge area flanks the west side of the Gull Lake uplands between Gull Lake and PTH No. 59, and also extends south of Stead Road. It is served by a shallow perched gravelly sand aquifer system that is characteristic of the Gull Lake upland. This aquifer is ~15 metres (m) to 20 m in thickness immediately surrounding Gull Lake. It is unconfined and wedge-like in shape, as its distribution, thickness, and saturation varies in areas away from the vicinity of Gull Lake. It is the groundwater source that discharges at the Brokenhead springs along PTH 59.

A separate and deeper buried valley aquifer is located ~60 m below Gull Lake. It is confined, and can be up to 15 m in thickness. This aquifer is a common primary source for domestic water for seasonal and permanent residences in the region, notably along Gull Lake. Some shallow wells may also be present in the region that are sourcing groundwater from the shallower aquifer zone noted above.

2. Gull Lake is a perched kettle lake situated ~37 m above the Lake Winnipeg elevation. It has a surface area of ~110 ha and an average depth of 3.3 m. Its total volume is ~4 million cubic metres (m<sup>3</sup>). Gull Lake is fed to a limited extent by groundwater discharge from the shallow aquifer system (at least locally). The lake water balance is dominated however, by precipitation (i.e. rainfall, snow, snowmelt). The shallow aquifer system is perched above low permeability clay. Because of this clay barrier, groundwater within the shallow aquifer flows outward from the Gull Lake uplands to the margins of the upland aquifer areas (such as toward the Brokenhead springs), as opposed to percolating downward to recharge the deeper aquifer zones.

West of Gull Lake, there is a steep drop in surface elevations and associated water levels in the shallow aquifer, and a transition to coarser gravel sediments, resulting in a deeper water table within this area. The shallow aquifer thins and pinches out west of PTH 59, where the shallow groundwater flow system is forced to surface, creating the line of discharge spring sites and marl ponds of the Ecological Reserve.

Residential development along Gull Lake dates back to the 1930's and, as noted above, currently comprises seasonal and permanent residences. The Gull Lake Basin Management Board Inc. monitors Gull Lake's water quality.

3. Quarry operations in the Gull Lake area date back to the 1950's. These lands have an abundant supply of aggregate near the ground surface and the area is also close to established hauling routes (Provincial and Municipal roads). Still, the potential adverse effects from gravel quarries on the surrounding natural and social environment, including the Ecological Reserve, Gull Lake and area residences (e.g. groundwater contamination, wildlife / habitat loss, soil erosion, noise / dust / vibration, accidents / malfunctions) cannot be overlooked.


Public concern over these potential adverse effects has been expressed to RM of St. Clements Council and staff. Consequently, the RM of St. Clements corresponded with the Province (c/o the Department of Sustainable Development) on May 24, 2019 in both advocating for – and seeking clarification on – these concerns. In response, the Province referred the RM of St. Clements to a report, entitled 'A Groundwater Atlas of the Gull Lake Area, Manitoba' (2017), which reviewed this issue (and is also referenced throughout this project description). Its findings concluded that there was no evidence at that time to suggest that gravel quarries affected Gull Lake, due to the following:

- a) Excavations from quarry operations have remained above the water table.
- b) As shown on Figure 3, nearly all quarries, including operations south of Stead Road (which also includes the site), are situated outside the immediate catchment of the local groundwater recharge in and around Gull Lake proper (i.e. the Gull Lake basin). As mentioned above, as a perched kettle lake situated above a low permeability clay barrier, the water balance and recharge of Gull Lake is dominated by precipitation, versus shallow groundwater contributions. Because of this clay barrier, groundwater flows outward and away from Gull Lake.

At the same time however, the RM of St. Clements also recognizes that the aquifer systems in the region of Gull Lake are critically important resources. The shallow aquifer system in particular, requires careful consideration due to its proximity to ground surface; the risk of surface recharge because the sand and gravel composition of the aquifer has relatively high permeability; and its important contribution to shallow groundwater flows and to the spring sites and marl ponds of the Ecological Reserve.

The above information is provided to demonstrate that the RM of St. Clements recognizes that, should this project advance to the pre-planning stage, sufficient care and due diligence will be necessary to determine whether the potential adverse effects of the project on both the natural and built environments can be appropriately addressed.

## 2.0 Policy and Regulatory Context

### 2.1 The Mines and Minerals Act (1991)

Quarries, including gravel pits, are regulated by The Mines and Minerals Act. Quarry approvals are administered by the Department of Growth, Enterprise and Trade.

The Mines and Minerals Act, including the implementing regulations, permitting and approval requirements, cover the full life cycle of prospective quarry operations, from pre-planning and site design, to site preparation, operations and progressive rehabilitation. The intent is to strive for a balance between the needs of industry, communities and the environment.

### 2.2 Provincial Planning Regulation (2011)

The Provincial Planning Regulation (2011 PPR) falls under The Planning Act. It reflects the provincial government's interest in land and resource use and sustainable development, and provides policy direction for a comprehensive, integrated and coordinated approach to land use planning. It also serves as a guide to planning authorities in preparing, reviewing and amending Development Plans and regional strategies.

The 2011 PPR stresses the importance of protecting aggregate resources from conflicting land uses as a means to uphold the public interest and minimize construction and environmental costs. In addition to providing long-term security and access to mineral resources, the 2011 PPR also recognizes that quarry mineral extraction and harvesting must occur in an environmentally responsible and sustainable manner [S. 8.1].

### **2.3 Red River Planning District Development Plan By-law 272/19**


The RM of St. Clements is part of the Red River Planning District (Planning District), which also includes the City of Selkirk, Village of Dunnottar and the RMs of St. Andrews, West St. Paul and East St. Paul. The Planning District enables member municipalities to work together to coordinate policies and programs relating to land use and development.

The Planning District Development Plan (Development Plan) is a long range plan prepared under The Planning Act and shall be consistent with the 2011 PPR. The Development Plan sets out the plans and policies of the Planning District in regards to the use and development of land. Of particular note, Development Plan objectives regarding the project focus on protecting areas capable of supporting mines or quarries, while also ensuring that measures are in place to address potential negative effects from such developments on the environment and surrounding land uses [S. 1.2].

As shown on Figure 4, the site is designated 'Resource & Agriculture (RA)' in the Development Plan. The intent of the 'RA' designation is to protect areas for agricultural uses as well as mines and quarries. Policy highlights are below:

1. In areas capable of supporting mines or quarries, permitted uses are those that will provide access to the resource until such time that it has been exhausted and the site is rehabilitated (note the standard of rehabilitation will be determined in consultation with the Province and in accordance with The Mines and Minerals Act) [S. 3.8.1; 4.1.1; 4.1.2].
2. Areas within 500 m of the property limits of an active mine or quarry site shall be restricted in their use to provide a suitable buffer zone [S. 3.8.2; 4.1.3].
3. The use(s) of exhausted mine or quarry sites shall be compatible with the resource base as well as adjacent land uses and landscapes [S. 3.8.3].
4. Mines and quarries shall be listed as a conditional use in the Zoning By-law [S. 3.8.5].
5. All development applications for mines and quarries shall include a site plan, showing the manner in which the development will occur, and the intended use(s) of the site after the resource has been exhausted. Note other information such as environmental and cultural conditions as well as surrounding land uses may also be required [S. 3.8.8].

 RM of St Clements | Gull Lake Quarry




## 2.4 RM of St. Clements Zoning By-law No. 5-2002

The RM of St. Clements Zoning By-law (Zoning By-law) implements the Development Plan with more specific land use and development regulations. As shown on Figure 5, the site is zoned 'Agricultural General (A80)' in the Zoning By-law. The 'A80' Zone accommodates a wide range of permitted and conditional uses, including farming, livestock operations as well as mines and quarries.

As per the Development Plan, mines and quarries are listed as conditional uses under the 'A80' Zone. Conditional uses are uses that are generally consistent with other uses in that zone. They may be allowed at the discretion of Council, subject to a review of site-specific considerations, and provided certain conditions are met as part of the development review process. Approved conditional uses must still however, conform to the other applicable regulations of the Zoning By-law.

### 3.0 Project Principles

As shown on Figure 6, a test pit program was recently conducted on most of the site by Glacial Aggregates Inc. in order to determine their potential for ‘traffic gravel’ production. A total of 58 test holes were excavated. Interval descriptions were recorded for every test hole and select samples were taken. The production potential for traffic gravel was then determined by the stone content which was identified by visual estimates combined with sieve analysis.

For reference, the deposits highlighted in yellow on Figure 6 are the highest potential zones in the test area and have a high enough stone concentration for use as traffic gravel. The deposits highlighted in purple and red on Figure 6 contain high stone contents, but would need to be pre-screened for use as traffic gravel.

 RM of St Clements | Gull Lake Quarry




Table 1 highlights the test pit program results, which shows an estimated stone volume of 445,798 metric tonnes, and an estimated gravel production volume ranging from 743,000 to 1,114,498 metric tonnes.

Though not tested, additional gravel resources are expected to be present on the portion of the site to the west of the Northwest Test Area.

Based on the above information, the RM of St. Clements views this project as both an economic development opportunity as well as an opportunity to demonstrate 'best practices' in gravel mining and progressive rehabilitation. As the owner of the site and the project proponent, the RM of St. Clements views the project as an opportunity to use the gravel to support its future public infrastructure projects (capital and maintenance projects only i.e. the gravel would not be made available for sale to – or use by – the private sector). With this in mind, and based on an anticipated extraction rate of ~35,000 metric tonnes per year, the project would have a projected 20 to 30 year life cycle. Over this period, it is estimated that the RM of St. Clements could save its ratepayers as much as \$175,000 per year on public infrastructure spending (or a total savings ranging from ~\$3.5M to \$5.25M).

Still, it merits repeating that the RM of St Clements is equally cognisant of the potential adverse effects from the project. As such and consistent with its own municipal works and operations, the RM of St. Clements acknowledges and supports the following principles as the basis for introducing the project:

1. Working collaboratively with area stakeholders as well as the Planning District and Province, regarding issues and concerns about the project and possible strategies and solutions to address them throughout all project stages (i.e. pre-planning, design, operations, rehabilitation, and remediation).
2. Ensuring compliance to all applicable Provincial, Planning District and local policies, regulations and standards, and obtaining all required permits and approvals.
3. Engaging in pre-planning and site design work, focusing on:
  - a) Technical assessments (e.g. hydrogeological assessment; well monitoring throughout all project stages; natural / cultural heritage assessments; traffic impact study; noise / dust / vibration analyses).
  - b) Operational and phasing plans (e.g. extraction zone and phasing details; buffer zones; noise and visibility berms; site storage areas; hours of operation; site circulation / haul routes; security; emergency response provisions; project monitoring, progressive site rehabilitation / remediation). The hours of operation in particular, would be planned for during the weekdays only to coincide with typical municipal operations. In addition, all stone crushing activities would be planned to occur once every three years during the late Fall or Winter months over the project life cycle.
  - c) Ensuring compliance with Provincial regulations and conformity to the Development Plan and Zoning By-law.
  - d) Implementing the recommended mitigation measures from the technical assessments and operational and phasing plans, which are anticipated to address the following:
    - i. minimizing the project footprint,
    - ii. avoiding environmentally sensitive areas,
    - iii. maintaining natural drainage patterns,
    - iv. confirming project setback, noise/visibility berm and/or residential buffer zone requirements (e.g. Provincial regulations require 400 m residential buffer zones if

proposed project setbacks and/or noise/visibility berms will not adequately manage adverse project effects on nearby residences),

- v. using erosion controls (e.g. silt fencing),
  - vi. applying water to access road(s) and water / dust skirts on conveyors,
  - vii. ensuring excavation activities remain above the water table,
  - viii. confirming the hours of project operations,
  - ix. maintaining the slope stability of excavated areas and revegetate where required,
  - x. using proper fuel containment and equipment maintenance and storage techniques,
  - xi. salvaging and properly storing organics, topsoil and overburden for use during progressive site rehabilitation works, and
  - xii. preparing Operations-Maintenance and Emergency Response Manuals.
4. Further to the outcome of the above assessment, design and engagement work, implement recommended progressive site rehabilitation (i.e. once extraction in a phased area is complete, rehabilitation would be initiated using the stripping from the preceding extraction area) and remediation works to accommodate adaptive re-use of the site for community benefit (e.g. naturalization, cycling paths, walking trails).

In light of COVID-19 protocols, we would like to offer the Brokenhead Ojibway Nation an opportunity to have an introductory virtual meeting with us and RM officials (via Zoom) to discuss the project, and receive your initial feedback about it. 



The summer months are dominated by South winds in this area, which would carry the dust (and noise) from the site toward Gull Lake residences and beyond. To the social and health impact ramifications, I will add a safety impact concern. The Brokenhead and Stead Road / Highway 59 intersections will be significantly busier and made more dangerous from increased truck traffic.</p> <p>Environmental Impact: There will be significant clearing of natural forest and wildlife habitat destruction on the immense proposed site. The Stakeholder document points out that Gull Lake gains much of its water through precipitation. However, it is also a catchment basin for surface runoff from the surrounding area and this was not adequately addressed in the document. Further, the document acknowledges concerns for local aquifers one of which is a primary source of water for residences. In short, the actual effect on the wetlands around our lake and the aquifers in unknown – this is a risk we cannot tolerate. The impact on the Brokenhead Wetland Ecological Reserve – Figure 2 of the Stakeholder Engagement Document – shows that the proposed quarry runs directly through the Wetland Recharge Area. The impact on this ecological wonder will not be truly known until after the mine is in operation, and the damage will be done. The Engagement Document does an excellent job of describing this natural resource, and any risk to this land should have been enough to end this proposal before it even came to other stakeholders:</p> <p>"The Province formally identified the Brokenhead Wetland Ecological Reserve in 2005. Initially comprising 563 hectares (ha), the Ecological Reserve was expanded in 2012 to its current extent of 1,240 ha. It is managed by Debwendon Inc., a non-profit organization made up of representatives from Brokenhead Ojibway Nation, the Native Orchid Conservation Inc., and Manitoba Model Forest. The Ecological Reserve contains 23 rare and uncommon plants; 28 of Manitoba's 36 native orchids; 8 of Manitoba's 10 carnivorous (or insect-eating) plants; and unique forested habitats. The north block west of PTH No. 59 includes a peat-accumulating wetland, which originates as a series of spring-fed ponds. A 1.5 km trail was installed in 2016, which extends through the forest, past the ponds and into the wetland area."</p> <p>Economic Impact: Any further development of industrial mining in this area will undoubtedly lead to degradation of the natural resource of Gull Lake which will result in reduction of our homes' values which will directly impact tax revenue. Additionally, the many adverse side effects of yet another gravel pit could cause reduced traffic to South Beach area and the protected environmentally and culturally sensitive Ojibway Brokenhead Wetlands Ecological Reserve.</p> <p>An industrial mine can in no way be considered "harmonious" with the recreational use of Gull Lake. Gravel pit development to the northwest of the lake basin is threatening to potentially damage the basin and drain the lake. No one seems to be concerned; most residents don't even know about the activity because it occurred over the winter. You can imagine their shock when they drive down Arnhold Street to their cottages and see that the trees have been leveled on both sides of the road. Industries such as logging and mining definitely pull in profit for the rural municipalities; I fully understand the necessity turning a profit. However, in this case, the RM that is profiting from the activity is not EVEN the governing body of the cottage owners. The majority of Gull Lake-goers are not in the tax-base of the RM of Alexander -- they are in the Rural Municipality of St. Clements. Why does the RM of Alexander care what Gull Lakers think? The RM isn't making any money off of them. It is also very hard effect positive change (or change at all) when the problem lies within a governing body that is not your own. My goal is to raise awareness so that people understand what is going on. Ideally we need an environmental study to be done in order to halt the digging. This study would be enough to stop Chabot Enterprises, the digging company, in their tracks -- at least temporarily. This is not just another gravel pit -- this pit threatens the integrity of the Gull Lake ecosystem. I would love nothing more than to have the gravel pit activity stopped and the area reforested so that Gull Lake residents do not have to fear for the future of our lake. Attached is an open letter that I wrote to express the circumstances and how I feel about the situation. I took ecology courses as part of my university degree. I understand the science behind what is happening. For me it is more than just the science; I am so attached to this place and I know that so many others are as well. We are a community that is in complete despair over the fate of our lake. At this time we need nothing more than to protect Gull Lake. I know these developments are not in your jurisdiction; however, I implore you to consider the implications of this activity allowed by your colleagues at Alexander. I wish to raise awareness for this pressing issue:</p> <p>"I have a strong memory from my cabin at Gull Lake when I was 4 years old. It was one day in the summer on a hot afternoon. I clearly remember being perched on my dad's shoulders as we trekked down an ATV trail through the forest adjacent to the lake. The trip had started as a Saskatoon-berry-picking mission and ended as an adventure to the gravel pits. I remember looking out at the vast hole in the earth and being awed by just how large it was. Four years ago, I had a few friends down to the cabin for a weekend. We decided to hike up to the pits one afternoon. This time I took photos of the canyon; they weren't very good because I unfortunately had a Blackberry, but they were awe-inspiring nonetheless. From our position the elevation was such that we could see Lake Winnipeg on the western horizon. The other day my grandfather and I hiked up the same ATV trail to inspect the newest pit in the operation. The old pit was still there to the south with a few evergreen saplings poking up through the gravel and rubble that remains. In the new pit the backhoe was digging, the crusher was crushing, and the gravel trucks were rolling in and out. To the north, you can almost see the several acres that have been clear-cut to make way for new pits. Maybe 50 feet of brush is left between Highway 59 and the excavation site. Soon, the gravel pit site will extend all the way to Highway 12. For some background: Gull Lake is a spring-fed lake. This means that it is not subject to high pollution entering from external sources, but if pollution occurs it is a complex situation to solve. Before and after I was born, in the 1990's, the lake became very polluted. Excessive fertilizer and water consumption caused eutrophication of the lake. The fish died, algal blooms were intense, there was no oxygen – the lake was dead. After the installation of an aeration system the lake came back to life; it became the lake I knew as a child growing up. My family has been on the lake since the 1930's. Nearly 90 years of residence; nearly 90 years of memories. The concern with the gravel pits, besides being an eyesore and destroyers of the Boreal forest ecosystem, is that they are located below the water level of Gull Lake -- 40 feet below, to be precise. Gull Lake has a clay basin and has a fairly high purge rate. The water purges through the clay bottom at the very northwest corner of the lake – right where the gravel pit development is happening. Should the sensitive basin break and the seepage rate increase, the lake has the potential to drain into the gravel pits. The gravel pits are located merely hundreds of meters from the edge of the lake. Both sides of the South shore access road, Arnhold Street, are now barren. It angers me that the Rural Municipality of Alexander has allowed this to happen. What's even worse is that all of the activity began over the fall and winter when most lake residents have closed up their cottages and headed for home. There was hardly a soul around to notice the changes that were happening. Chabot Enterprises is the company spearheading the development. Unfortunately the company is not entirely the bad guy. Chabot did their due diligence in getting permits and jumping through all of the legal hoops. It was the RM of Alexander that failed; it failed to consider the best interests of the cottage owners and lake-goers. Because most of the property on Gull Lake is part of the Rural Municipality of St. Clements, the stakeholders affected cannot even approach their own municipal government for help on the matter. Alexander has control over the allowance of the industrial activity. Naturally Alexander does not consider the property owners' circumstances, as they are not in their municipality. Alexander claims that they have no authority in the matter but of course they do – the activity is occurring in their jurisdiction with their permission. A more appropriate statement would be that they would prefer not to get into legal battles. Interestingly enough, the Reeve of Alexander owns a company that has business dealings with Chabot. Coincidence? Perhaps; then again, perhaps not. Chabot claims that if the lake was going to drain into the gravel pits, it would have happened by now. Perhaps this is true; however, why take that risk? This is the perfect example of how we as humans can be so very reactive. Instead of taking precautions and considering the ramifications of our activities, we prefer to take the "wait and see" approach. Is it not better to be safe than sorry? What if Gull Lake is drained dry? If is a very small word but the consequences can be extraordinary. It breaks my heart to see the logs piled high and the shrubbery ripped out of the ground. It pains me to see the sky instead of the tops of decades-old trees. So let us stand up for Gull Lake. Let us stand up for anyone who has ever cared or will ever care about Gull Lake. Let us stand up for the environment in all of its brilliance. Let us respect it and protect it. Nuisance and Property Value: The summer months are dominated by South winds, which can be expected to carry dust and noise from the site toward Gull Lake residences. My experience as a cottage owner on Arnhold St. is that existing quarries generate a significant amount of noise; The proposed quarry appears to be in direct violation of the Selkirk and District Development Plan By-Law 190/08, which states "Resort areas shall be afforded protection from adjacent uses that would degrade or endanger their primary function. The concerns are as follows:</p> <p>Gull Lake Watershed: Irreparable damage to the current water shed of Gull Lake. I am old enough to remember the problems with the old Winnipeg Supply Aggregate Mine currently called the Inland Quarry. In an attempt to expand the mining operation of the Winnipeg Supply Quarry and harvest more gravel from the site a deeper depth was excavated. As a direct result of this foolhardy endeavor the Gull Lake Watershed was breached and before emergency repairs could be made at the site of excavation the lake water level dropped significantly and remained at that level for several years following. The Quarry was flooded and repairs were made and further excavation was halted. This scenario points out how fragile the Gull Lake Watershed and the ecosystem that it supports actually is. Residents of Gull Lake currently utilize the Gull Lake Watershed for their wells and clean potable water supply, and several tens of thousands of dollars have been spent by the residents procuring their private water supplies. All of which are potentially in jeopardy with further Aggregate Mining Operations in the Gull Lake Area.</p> <p>Air Quality and Potential for Silica Contamination: There are numerous scientific articles in both the Canadian and American literature about the risks of air contamination with Silica Dust Particles both at the Quarry site and distant from the Quarry site. As you may or may not know, Silica is a carcinogen that is more than capable of causing direct bodily harm by initiating a cancerous process mostly involving the lungs. This is of significant concern and has been the concern that has launched class action legal action to halt aggregate mining operations in a number of jurisdictions. I have concerns for the current generations of people who enjoy their life at Gull Lake and its regions, as well as the future generations that would derive the same enjoyment of the region.</p> <p>Noise Pollution: As residents of the south shore of Gull Lake we all know from past experiences with the previous Winnipeg Supply Quarry and the Inland Quarry that noise pollution has been a major factor in spite of berms being present at the perimeter of the quarry. Yes there are noise by-laws for the RM but they were never enforced, and the operators had carte blanche to operate into the late evenings Monday through Saturday and on more than rare occasion Sundays as well. 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	<p>Irreparable Damage to the Ecosystem of the Gull Lake Basin and Region: I expanded on a portion of this aspect in the opening concerns. However, there are fragile waterfowl habitats, native wild flowers, and grasses that are peculiar to the Gull Lake Basin and once these are disturbed they are gone forever.</p> <p>Deforestation and Impact of Deforestation on Climate Change and Carbon Footprint: As Canadians we are all keenly aware of the Paris Accord and our Country's Mandate to lower our Carbon Foot Print. This starts with preventing deforestation, which is a major contributor to global warming and the worldwide impacts of this. There cannot be an open pit Aggregate Quarry Mining Operation without Deforestation! A recent example that is fresh in the minds of Gull Lake Property Owners involves the deforestation of the North West Corner at the junction of Arnhold Street, Highway 12 and Highway 59. While this property was privately owned and resides in the RM of Alexander the premise if the same. There was massive deforestation of pristine Boreal Forest in the area and the site was subsequently found to be unsuitable for Aggregate Operations. Yet the area was not brought back to its original condition.</p> <p>Restoration of the landscape: I have enjoyed time in the Gull Lake area since 1955 and throughout all of those years I have never seen previous aggregate quarry sites brought back to pre-quarry days with planting of grasses and trees to allow reforestation. Whether this is not a Provincial Mandate or is a Provincial Mandate that has been neglected is open to question and clarification. Nonetheless it is a concern for all in the Gull Lake Area with the current inactive Quarries.</p> <p>Heavy Equipment Carbon Footprint and Pollution: Most if not all heavy equipment , including transport trucks are diesel powered and carry with them a significant degree of CO2 pollution and the air quality issues that accompany the use of such equipment. Then there is the refueling and spillage of diesel fuel and hydraulic fluid that can and will percolate through the porous gravel and sand and contaminate the ground water table and Gull Lake Watershed with hydrocarbons, most of which are carcinogens. Obviously, the addition of that number of vehicles to the area will result in a huge noise increase from engines, air brakes, gear changes, back up alarms etc. This will simply destroy the tranquility and enjoyment of the area for its residents.</p> <p>Environmental – Wildlife Impact: The area surrounding the current pits, is an active and relatively safe sanctuary for everything from foxes and bears, to deer and other smaller wildlife that each play a role in maintaining and preserving the ecosystem. I live in the community of Gull Lake Manitoba, a small lake approximately two kilometers long by half a kilometer wide, and located in all of your districts (latitude and longitude 50.410, -96.515). We have approximately 400 residences in the immediate vicinity, they are a mix of full and part time residents (approximately 25%, 75% respectively), and the lake itself is divided by the border of both provincial and municipal constituencies. The area is rich in mineral deposits and we have multiple aggregate quarries currently active in the area. In recent years there has been a dramatic increase in the activities in the old mines and a new mine opened. Our two lake associations (Gull Lake Rate Payers Association, and Gull Lake Basin Management Board) have been representing the communities opposition to development in the area and at this point I feel there cries are not being listened to. As a property owner and a tax payer I am asking that the expansions of the currently active quarry boundaries and approval of new aggregate quarries in the surrounding area be stopped. The active and proposed four sites along PTH 12 (between PTH 59 and Stead Rd) and two sites along Stead Rd (between PTH 59 and PHT 12) present significant impact on the local environment. The actual effect to the wetlands and aquifers that these proposals will do to Gull Lake itself is unknown. Additionally there will be significant impact and loss of habitat to local ecology: birds, small and large mammals, flora, insects etc. which inhabit the area (this area is home to Red-headed Woodpeckers, and Lady's-slipper orchids, both Threatened Species as identified in the Canadian Species at Risk Act). The amount of devastation to the natural environment proposed by these development plans is unacceptable. In addition no attempt has been made to reforest any of the areas that have already been mined and abandoned or test mined for quality. The issues these proposals present are not just related to environmental aspects, they also have a dramatic effect on value of the area. Both Stead Rd and PTH 12 are two lane roads in rather bad condition. The lanes have degraded to the point when painting lines the outside line is actually painted on the gravel shoulder because the road is no longer wide enough. The shoulders are very narrow (a meter at most) before the steeply descend into the ditches. Continual heavy truck traffic will eviscerate what is remaining. I have thoroughly reviewed the proposed Gull Lake Quarry Master Plan Community and Stakeholder Engagement Request that has recently been disseminated throughout the community. After a careful review of the proposal, I am writing to express my full objection to the proposed Gull Lake Quarry development. Furthermore, I strongly object to any similar gravel mining project in this site and its surrounding areas. My family is a member of the Red River Métis with scrip to the land on which the gravel pit is proposed, I have serious concerns regarding how the gravel pit will affect the land, environment, and ecosystem which my family has worked for generations to preserve. Historically the Métis people and their voices have been ignored in the decision making regarding the lands on which we have been the guardians for eternity. My people and the Nations in the region were the guardians of the land before settlers arrived and we will continue to be stewards of the land long after any proposed gravel pit closes (if one were to be established). I encourage the municipality to fully consult and listen to its stakeholders and rights holders (i.e. Indigenous communities and members) in the region. Previous projects of a similar nature have detrimentally impacted my quality of life and that of my family. For example, the property had an abundance of fresh water when our family purchased the property in 1987. This water supply was essential to our day-to-day activities living in a relatively remote and isolated area. This was particularly important as we were a young family with a new baby, which required daily laundry, baths and maintaining a household of three. This changed significantly in the spring of 1996 when massive piles of crushed gravel were discarded at the site of the old garbage dump. When the municipality removed this gravel, it adversely altered the water stream aquifer that fed my property. The water table declined dramatically. As a result, we had to take meticulous care to manage and conserve our water. Our ability to bathe to achieve basic human dignity was severely limited. We had to supplement our drinking water and travel of Beausejour to do our laundry on a weekly basis. This was a significant challenge for our low-income family, as my husband was injured at work and we were surviving off disability benefits. After months of adversity and a great deal of careful planning and sacrifice, we cobbled together the finances required to drill a 225 foot well. Although this solved our water issue at the time, the challenging and upsetting experience has left a lasting impression on myself and my family. As a widow living alone, my finances and capacity to adapt to environmental changes are limited. My concerns are too significant to be comforted or convinced by any of the promises of a sustainable and environmentally attentive operation. I am also aware that even the most carefully planned mining operations can have lasting impacts on the environment and its wildlife. Furthermore, even if the municipality could assure me that the environmental impact could be minimized, I am concerned about the long-term effects on the environment. 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	<p>concerned about the impacts on the biodiversity and impacts of noise, dust pollution, and contaminated water on ecosystems, as well as the ability of Indigenous peoples to hunt, fish, and harvest. Not only does it provide an opportunity to see rare flora and ecology of the area, it provides a quiet place for contemplation of nature. The adverse effects of a quarry operation (environmental, noise, dust, increased truck traffic) will significantly impact this sacred and culturally significant site.</li> <li>2. Visual Impact: The operation of the quarry will have a significant impact on the visual aesthetics of the area. Although berms can be built to prevent residents and visitors from seeing much of the quarry extraction site, stockpiles and crushing equipment will remain visible. In our view, there is no level of "hiding" the extraction site that will eliminate the scarring of the landscape.</li> <li>3. Water Levels &amp; Quality: Public concern over potential effects of quarry operations to the Gull Lake aquifer and the Brokenhead wetlands have been voiced repeatedly to the RM. Despite this, the decision by the RM to hire Scatliff + Miller + Murray to prepare a Master Plan for a proposed quarry in the Gull Lake area is extremely upsetting. Were our voices not heard? Although the RM acknowledges that the aquifer systems in the Gull Lake area are critically important resources and will require sufficient care and due diligence to determine whether adverse effects can be appropriately addressed, we question whether the RM is taking these concerns seriously. Reliance on one report prepared by the province in 2017 is questionable. Have things changed since the report was written? Was testing done over a long enough period? Was testing done during periods of high rainfall as well as periods of low rainfall? In our minds, the true effects on wetlands and aquifers are still unknown.</li> <li>4. Environment: Operation of a quarry has a significant impact on the environment including loss of habitat for wildlife and soil erosion. In addition, with soil disruption, invasive plants can be introduced stunting the growth of native plants thereby changing the natural habitat beyond the confines of the quarry. Has the RM done an environmental impact study to address the environmental concerns related to wildlife, plant species, soil erosion, and water quality? Furthermore, the proposed plan mentions there will be fuel containment within the site. What impact will this have on the environment as it relates to onsite spills?</li> <li>5. Noise &amp; Vibration: The extraction, processing and hauling of gravel will result in significant noise and vibration. Noise pollution has an effect on the natural ecosystem and creates an extremely unpleasant environment for residents, animals and wildlife. The proposed quarry is also opposite the green space that was developed and is used and appreciated by the residents of Gull Lake. It is disappointing that this space would no longer be suitable for outdoor activities and quiet nature walks. The RM's solution for mitigating the adverse effects of noise, which they acknowledge is a real concern, is to limit the hours of operation to weekdays and to undertake all stone crushing activities in the late fall or winter months. This shows a complete lack of understanding about the residents of Gull Lake. Not only are there permanent residents who would be subjected to noise pollution throughout the year but the RM's assumption that seasonal residents are only at their cottage on weekends during the summer months is outdated thinking. Many seasonal residences use their cottages throughout the year and spend significantly more time than just weekends at their cottage. Thus, they too will be subjected to ongoing noise pollution.</li> <li>6. Dust, Air Quality &amp; Health: Dust or airborne particulate matter varies in size. Large particles tend to settle quickly whereas smaller particles, which are more harmful, can be carried great distances especially in windy conditions that are common to this area. Dust will be produced from various quarry operations including extraction, crushing, screening, stacking and loading. Dust will also be produced from wind blowing over stockpiles and across pit floors. The dust produced is harmful to vegetation and to the health of wildlife, animals and humans. Dust settling on plants and trees will reduce photosynthesis and ultimately growth of the plant or tree. Fine particulate can be inhaled by humans, animals, and wildlife and is considered toxic under the Canadian Environment Protection Act. It will also have long lasting negative impacts on the environment. If you could please outline what benefits this quarry would have on the community in close proximity, I would gladly appreciate it. As for the negative impacts to the community, I am sure you are well aware. Several of them relate to any quarry development regardless of how much of a “model” you plan this quarry to be, they cannot be avoided. Issues such as deforestation, dust and air pollution, water pollution, noise pollution, wildlife displacement, additional vehicle traffic and many, many others. In addition to all those, there are also some more specific to the exact location of the proposed quarry. There are a multitude of reasons for our opposition of such plans, but we will highlight some of the most concerning.</p> <p>Gravel Truck Traffic: In order to deliver the aggregate to market gravel trucks are used to haul the material to the customers. These trucks have a capacity of between 11 and 22 tonnes depending on the number of wheels and the physical size of the unit. Dependent on the amount of deliveries anticipated, this would have the potential of up to an additional 10+ trucks travelling down Stead Road and adjoining areas a day. This would mean noisy gravel trucks up and down Stead Road every day. In addition, Stead Road and Hwy 12 – are both roads that residents utilize with children to either walk to and from the local grocery store, or ride bikes for ice cream during the summer months. This would turn from a relatively safe and controlled area – to one with exponentially increased risk and or the elimination of daily outings that make Gull Lake such a pleasure to be a part of. If the operation time of the quarry is limited to 12 hours per day 6 days per week the truck trips would be multiple trucks, pulling on to Stead Road and merging onto Hwy 59 or Hwy 12. When merge times are added for existing vehicle use, increases the traffic/accident risk of merging significantly on what are already notoriously dangerous stretches of highway. The sheer Tare weight of the vehicles themselves, will also serve to significantly erode what is already a badly deteriorated road (Stead Road).</p> <p>Pollution – Air &amp; Noise: In addition to the huge traffic and safety concerns which will be created by such an enterprise, there will be an immense increase in exhaust gases produced by this large number of trucks. However, this is not the only source of air pollution. Fugitive Dust Emissions are also generated from the plant yard due to vehicular traffic and wind. (<a href="https://businessimpactenvironment.wordpress.com/2012/01/08/environmental-issues-in-stone-crushers/">https://businessimpactenvironment.wordpress.com/2012/01/08/environmental-issues-in-stone-crushers/</a>)</p> <p>This dust settles on the vehicles during loading operation and is then blown off as the truck moves down the highway. This fugitive dust is then deposited on the highway where it is then spread by all vehicles in the air as the tires pick it up. The dust is then in the air to be spread by the wind and is deposited on the surrounding environment where it can kill both vegetation and aquatic life depending on the formulation of the compound and its toxicity levels. Obviously, the addition of that number of vehicles to the area will result in a huge noise increase from engines, air brakes, gear changes, back up alarms etc. This will simply destroy the tranquility and enjoyment of the area for its residents.</p> <p>Environmental – Wildlife Impact: The area surrounding the current pits, is an active and relatively safe sanctuary for everything from foxes and bears, to deer and other smaller wildlife that each play a role in maintaining and preserving the ecosystem. What is being proposed can only be seen as detrimental to the existing wildlife as well as to the residents in the surrounding area. What is also unknown is any potential impact and contamination of ground water which for many residents and wildlife alike, constitute their drinking water source.</p> <p>Liability to Properties &amp; Business: There are no adequate financial instruments such as bonds and liability insurance in place to compensate for: Unforeseen consequences from operations on the environment (ie. water level fluctuations); Diminution in price of surrounding properties and businesses.</p> <p>These are some of our most glaring concerns. There are a sufficient amount of areas within the Province that have existing/active gravel pits. Why would there be a necessity to build and activate one in such close proximity to a treasured lake community? If it is to realize cost savings, and not pay fees to other quarries that are accessible within the St. Clements area – then we believe this would be an extremely short sighted view. We postulate that a significant amount of tax revenue is realized from residents/property owners in the Gull Lake area. 142	I stand with my community in expressing concern over this proposition. Specifically, my concerns are environmental, economic and community based. Regarding the environment, it is my understanding that aggregate extraction such as pits and quarries disrupt the existing movement of surface water and groundwater; they can interrupt natural water recharge which leads to reduced quantity and quality of drinking water for residents and wildlife near or downstream from a quarry site. This is significant for our local wetlands. Aggregate mining extracts everything required to sustain a healthy aquatic ecosystem necessary for good quality water. All vegetation, including trees and shrubs, the topsoil, and small life forms that inhabit the area are completely removed from the landscape. As well, gravel operations bring dust, noise and trucks and disrupt local quality of life. The effect of such operations also takes a toll on the condition of local roadways. According to <a href="http://www.gravelfacts.ca">www.gravelfacts.ca</a> , "Pits and quarries are, by nature, self-consuming. Once a quarry's stone, sand and gravel have been fully extracted it's no longer necessary to keep it open. Sites can stay open for 35 years or more but many are depleted within 5 years." This information leads me to question the cost/benefit of the project. If sustainable projects are of primary concern, I question if the potential of a '5 year' project is a viable plan. The proposition also does not address the associated costs of proper reclamation of the gravel pit after mining. The Gull Lake community is extremely invested in the health of the lake and surrounding areas. As recent as the 1990's our lake was dying, eutrophication had occurred; it was overtaken by algae and fish were not surviving. 170	<p>I am presenting a unique situation that requires input from all three levels of government in multiple municipalities. I live in the community of Gull Lake Manitoba, a small lake approximately two kilometers long by half a kilometer wide, and located in all of your districts (latitude and longitude 50.410, -96.515). We have approximately 400 residences in the immediate vicinity, they are a mix of full and part time residents (approximately 25%, 75% respectively), and the lake itself is divided by the border of both provincial and municipal constituencies. The area is rich in mineral deposits and we have multiple aggregate quarries currently active in the area. In recent years there has been a dramatic increase in the activities in the old mines and a new mine opened. Our two lake associations (Gull Lake Rate Payers Association, and Gull Lake Basin Management Board) have been representing the communities opposition to development in the area and at this point I feel there cries are not being listened to. As a property owner and a tax payer I am asking that the expansions of the currently active quarry boundaries and approval of new aggregate quarries in the surrounding area be stopped. The active and proposed four sites along PTH 12 (between PTH 59 and Stead Rd) and two sites along Stead Rd (between PTH 59 and PHT 12) present significant impact on the local environment. The actual effect to the wetlands and aquifers that these proposals will do to Gull Lake itself is unknown. Additionally there will be significant impact and loss of habitat to local ecology: birds, small and large mammals, flora, insects etc. which inhabit the area (this area is home to Red-headed Woodpeckers, and Lady's-slipper orchids, both Threatened Species as identified in the Canadian Species at Risk Act). The amount of devastation to the natural environment proposed by these development plans is unacceptable. In addition no attempt has been made to reforest any of the areas that have already been mined and abandoned or test mined for quality. The issues these proposals present are not just related to environmental aspects, they also have a dramatic effect on value of the area. Both Stead Rd and PTH 12 are two lane roads in rather bad condition. The lanes have degraded to the point when painting lines the outside line is actually painted on the gravel shoulder because the road is no longer wide enough. The shoulders are very narrow (a meter at most) before the steeply descend into the ditches. Continual heavy truck traffic will eviscerate what is remaining. The noise pollution created by rock crushers, heavy equipment, and engine breaking semi-trucks at all allowable hours will be vast and completely diminish the intent of a cottage as an escape from the "noise". Then there is the aesthetic value of the region, aggregate quarries are an eyesore, they do not add any value to the experience of a lake community. These last few issues are personal but should be the largest worry to the local municipalities. The habitat loss, noise, traffic, and associated disruption will certainly diminish the value of the region and interest in it. In conclusion the proposals regarding aggregate quarries in the area of Gull Lake Mb is completely tone deaf to the value of conserving the natural environment, and is not in the best interest of the residents closest to it. Once again, I stand in opposition to any and all expansions of the currently active quarry boundaries and approval of new aggregate quarries in the Gull Lake area. I would very much like to have the support of your offices in this stance.</p>

In the last few years I have seen an increase of my property value in tax bill that reflects these improvements. I am aware that this gravel project will increase the level of noise, dust and traffic of heavy gravel trucks in the area. I am also aware of the risk this has to potential water contamination and the wildlife in the area. This gravel pit will unavoidably have negative impacts on property values and quality of life for full-time and seasonal residents. It is a strong community of seasonal cottagers, year-round lake-side residents, country farmers and day trippers. We all bring something to the community to build the aesthetics of the area, recreation, the economy and community. We are diverse but what ties us together is our desire and commitment to see our community grow and thrive in positive ways. A gravel pit does not fit into this vision.
